

I also know that there are other gifts that I can bring to this non-profit related to my earlier life: leadership, project management, budgeting, planning, customer service, government regulation, and other really exciting corporate "stuff."

As much as this is a blessing, I also recognize that there is a lot of responsibility, here. Understanding the 24-hr/day responsibilities of radio, relying solely on donations from our generous donors, and trusting that the Lord has put me in the right place causes an anxiety that is different than the corporate world. The summer is tough in the non-profit world, and the number of monthly donations does not equal our expenses, meaning that all summer, our bank accounts

decrease.



She remembers her father coming home from work and teaching her to sketch. She said, "Dad was a very talented artist himself and nurtured my love for art." Her mother had her take dance lessons in kindergarten and

her love for art and dance grew with each passing year.

She attended St. Bernard's

copy some of the faces and paintings." With her babysitting money and allowance, she was able to take workshops from traveling artists which kept her artistic fire burning.

After high school, Toni worked at a local bank and the bank's President recognized her talent. He paid her \$50 to paint his portrait. When it was done, he and his wife invited her to their home so she could see it hanging over their fireplace. She was very proud to see it there and that opportuni-

ty encouraged her to pursue even further training.

When she was 21, she had saved enough money for a flight to Arlington, VA and a small apartment and said goodbye to her parents and Omaha. She had no plans for marriage, only being a dance instructor at the Arthur Murray School of Dance. On Wednesday nights, Toni and one of her close friends would go to the Officer's Club as drinks were 25 cents. They had a beautiful old wooden dance floor and a juke

box, which from her background in dance, was very familiar to her.

The Officer's Club was on the Potomac River and in one of those downstairs smoke-filled bars that you would see in an old movie. One night, a group of officers came down the steps in their dress uniforms and among them was Army Lieutenant Richard Rangel. Toni said, "To see all of these young guys come down the steps, looking so handsome, made every head turn." Richard asked her to dance.

She accepted his invitation to the dance but said, "Richard did the nineth grade shuffle, you know, feet apart and then waddling back and forth; he didn't have much rhythm." When he found out Toni was a dance instructor, he stopped in his tracks and said, "Okay, but I'm still going to lead." A few weeks later he asked her to the Colonel's picnic and that was the start of their future together. She said, "I have to admit, after I met him, I kept thinking about him, I kind of liked him."

To pay for their wedding, Toni went to work at Addressograph Multigraph. After they were married, they stayed in Omaha for three years and then transferred to Rapid City, SD. His dream was to become a General Contractor. Af-

ter his honorable discharge, they stayed in Rapid City and Richard started Rangel Construction.

Growing up and through the early years of her life, Toni didn't have the financial means to take art classes but that didn't stop her from pursuing her passion. She persevered and found creative ways to fuel her passion. This earned her place at the table to study with professional portrait artists like Charles Phillip Cross, and Award-winning Portrait Artist and Instructor, Margaret Carter Baumgartner. Toni herself is a Master of Portrait Art.

You can see Toni's beautiful artwork scattered throughout the Real Presence Radio network, in local Catholic churches, in homes and now it hangs in Rome. When Father Brian Christianson was going to study at the Pontifical College in Rome, asked her to paint a portrait of Pope Francis. She, of course agreed, and is humbled to know that her art is part of that collection. 
